Union Church of Biddeford Pool held its annual Blessing of the Animals at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, August 21 on the McPheeters' lawn. We had a few rain sprinkles, but we managed to get our service in before serious rain started We had about 25 people attend. Pastor Paula Norbert bestowed a blessing on 15 dogs. Each dog had a few words said about him or her and received Paula's blessing. Cotton Schlaver offered each pet-owner a bandana which said, "I am Blessed," as well as a collar tag with the same saying and, if wanted, a doggie, treat. In addition, financial donations were received for the Animal Welfare Society and Lucky Pup Rescue, each of which had representatives at our event. I want to thank all the many volunteers who helped make this blessing possible.





Union Church Mission Committee

The Union Church Mission Committee continues to provide financial support to our local mission partners: In-a-Pinch Non-Food Pantry, Seeds of Hope Neighborhood Center, Stone Soup Food Pantry, Saco Meals Program, Animal Welfare Society, Lucky Pup Rescue, Ever After Mustang Rescue and the Mission Hill Community Garden in Biddeford. In addition, we support a student in Kenya through Education for All Children, and a student in Belize at the Holy Cross Anglican School. We also set aside funds which we direct through the Rev. Shirley Bowen at Seeds of Hope Neighborhood to provide confidential assistance to individuals in need.

We also carry out charitable activities more directly.

- On the third Monday of most months a team of Union Church people make a meatloaf dinner for the Saco Meals Program.
- A few times a year, another team prepares a supper meal to provide to those using the In-a-Pinch Non-Food Pantry, which is located at Seeds of Hope.
- During the school year, a team of volunteers which grew out of the Knit Wits goes twice a month to the Alternative Pathways Center, Biddeford High School's program for students who learn differently. A separate article about this ministry can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.
- Each year we present the Blessing of the Animals service; this year's event is also described elsewhere in this newsletter.
- And in December we provide special holiday cheer to the guests at the Saco Meals Program and the students at the Alternative Pathways Center.
